




The Debba


Kings of the Earth


The Lovers


The Rebellion of Jane Clarke


Red Hook Road


A Novel, by Lynne Griffin




The Quest to Discover the Deepest Place on Earth, by James M. Tabor


The Bucolic Plague How Two Manhattanites Became Gentlemen Farmers: An Unconventional Memoir by Josh Kilmer-Purcell




Fur, Fortune, and Empire The Epic History of the Fur Trade in America, by Eric Jay Dolin




The Spice Necklace My Adventures in Caribbean Cooking, Eating, and Island Life, by Ann Vanderhoof
